Fall Updates

This fall has been bursting with activity at Thrive. We are so blessed by the community of people who attend and who gather to plan, pray for, and carry out the different parts of our programs. It is exciting to think of how the results might be used later.



Our ESL (English as a Second Language) classes continue on Mondays and Wednesdays. There is a beginning level class in the mornings and an intermediate level class in the evenings along with small group tutoring. We've recently welcomed new students from Guatemala and Thailand, and have been privileged to have some old students return. It is amazing to look back to a year ago and see how far some of the students have come in terms of both their language and the steps they've taken towards their family, career, and academic goals.

Our high school/adult Spanish classes have also continued on Tuesdays nights. There

are faithful students who have been working on their language for months, and others who have just started in either the low-beginning or high-beginning classes. It is exciting to witness some of them using their new skills with others in our community.

The biggest change recently, however, has been the addition of more youth foreign language classes. Our first Chinese classes got off the ground in September. There is one class for elementary school students and another for middle/high school students. A persistent group of high school students have also pushed ahead and started Spanish 2 this fall. Springing up organically from simultaneous awareness of a need and volunteers to meet the need, there has also been a small group of high school ESL students gathering for tutoring for their school subjects once a week.



For more casual opportunities, our multi-language Bible study has been glad to

welcome some new faces even if they are just passing through the area briefly, and we have been working through the book of Ephesians and finally have some long awaited songs in French and almost in Chinese in our rotation.

Our monthly international student social activities started out in September with a beautiful hike to the Haystacks at Loyalsock Creek. The day was filled with fall beauty, pleasant conversation, a few bandages, and some changes into dry clothes. All ended well, though! In October, we open up for students to express their creativity through pumpkin carving.

Martiza came to Thrive as an ESL student when she arrived from El Salvador. Since last year, she has filled multiple roles as an ESL student, an assistant/substitute in our Spanish classes, and an interpreter for high school tutoring. She is patient, reliable, encouraging, and a great role model of language learning.

Boubacar is originally from Mali. Like Martiza, he is an example of the Thrive community both learning and helping others. This fall, Boubacar stepped up to fill an urgent need as an all around assistant with the youth classes on Monday nights. He has been a registrar, computer trouble shooter, class assistant, and encourager. He makes everyone laugh and keeps class light hearted.

Marina is another example of the fluidity of roles within the Thrive community. Originally from Russia, she came to Thrive inquiring about ESL. She realized that our Spanish classes would be a better option for her, though, as she continued working on Spanish as her 3rd language. She has quickly put her developing Spanish to use volunteering first as an interpreter and then as an ESL tutor for a new Spanish-speaking family. She has been instrumental in helping them connect and learn.



Ana came from Venezuela several years ago. After visiting, she moved here permanently to be with her husband. She became a citizen and owned a restaurant for a while. She was a professional accountant and computer instructor in Venezuela. She studies in the ESL classes to improve her English to help her work toward re-entering the professional workforce. She has also taken on the responsibility of helping with Thrive's accounting. You may see her using English or Spanish as needed to give our students extra practice as she handles monthly payments.

Lasham is from Burma. He came in 2009, so he has had a long time here. He comes to class to learn English. He likes the ESL program. He is an amazing sushi chef and works at a local grocery store. He wants to speak English completely and often picks up other students for class or cheers everyone up with his sense of humor.

Volunteer Opportunities

Thrive is blessed by the help of many volunteers, and we often hear how they feel blessed by their interactions at Thrive. If you are interested in joining our volunteer team, we are looking for people to step in to meet the following needs. Feel free to prayerfully consider joining us even for just one shift per week.

- **ESL classroom assistants**-- Classroom assistants help as needed in class or with tutoring small groups on Mondays & Wednesdays from 8:45-10:15am and from 7:30-9:00pm. We're glad to help train interested volunteers; no experience is necessary.
- **Drivers**--Several of our ESL students don't drive, and there is no good bus route connecting their homes and the church in the evening. We have a need for a volunteer(s) to pick up students in the Williamsport area and bring them to class on Monday and Wednesday evenings by 7:30pm. It is a great opportunity to help them practice a little casual conversation and offer encouragement along the way.
- **Construction team**--Join us in January to help with remodeling and re-painting in the church basement where we hold most of our classes.
