Perhaps over the last year, newsletters have been more of a yearly function... It has been an exciting year, though, and it is a privilege to look back on the blessings of the year and look forward with anticipation to opportunities ahead.



The community of people God has put together at Thrive is one of our biggest blessings. Welcoming new students, giving rides to and from class, sharing ideas about where to find apartments or how to write resumes, helping each other with class tasks...examples are everywhere. The sense of community also comes up in the fluid nature of people's roles at Thrive. It can be hard to keep track of whether someone is a teacher, volunteer, student, or board member because many of our people serve and participate in multiple ways. We have had students from the Spanish classes and international college students who tutor, interpret for ESL students, and help with youth classes; current and former ESL students (and

their children) who teach, volunteer, and come as guests in our foreign language classes; and teachers and volunteers who invest their time studying other languages and coming on their days off. It is especially a privilege to hear comments when students from different classes, colleges, or countries look for one another at events. We're also grateful for the countless times people step up to help without being asked and when students say that they love class not only for the skills they learn, but also for the chance to be with each other.

In very tangible ways, the sense of community was also clear this past year at our fall benefit dinner & spring coffee house when so many hands quickly worked to pull everything together; the international student Thanksgiving when everyone relaxed and enjoyed new and old holiday traditions; the Christmas party when we were blessed to celebrate with almost twice as many participants as expected; our Chinese New Year celebration with lots of help from current and new teachers, students, and volunteers; the beginning of our summer youth programs with a whole team of staff and volunteers eager to help; and our summer picnic with a relaxing time by participants from our various programs. Most recently, it has been exciting to see the warmth and eagerness shared by the ESL and Adult Spanish classes as they started having break & conversation opportunities together in English & Spanish.



These kinds of experiences bring to life the challenge in Matthew 22:39 to "Love your neighbor as you love yourself" and a quote on our website by Smith and Carvill (2000) from *The Gift of the Stranger*: "We propose that foreign language education prepares students for two related callings: to be a blessing as strangers in a foreign land, and to be hospitable to strangers in their own homeland." We are truly blessed by the community God has put together at Thrive.

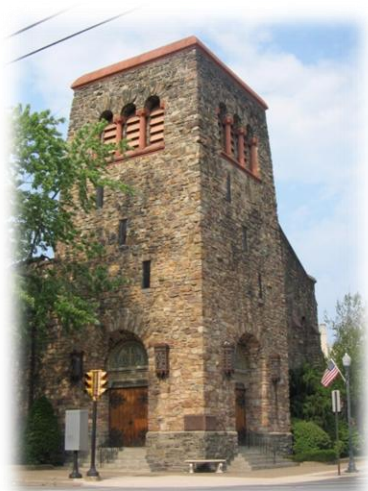
